Hepatitis C

Treatment Options and Resources

Hepatitis C (HCV, Hep C) is a chronic liver disease. Currently, there are many options for management and treatment. This handout will review recommendations and treatment options and provide resources for people who want information about hepatitis C infection.

Protect your liver – get vaccinated!

While there is currently no vaccination for hepatitis C, getting vaccinated for hepatitis A and B provides lifelong protection against hepatitis A, B, and D, which can cause additional complications and increased liver damage in people who have hepatitis C.

Vaccine for hepatitis A and B is widely available for adults and is covered by most types of insurance. Full protection can require up to three shots over a six-month period. Check with your healthcare provider or neighborhood pharmacy and stay updated on all your immunizations.

Drug and alcohol treatment programs:

Most providers will require that patients abstain from alcohol and be in recovery from street drug use for a minimum of six months before beginning treatment for hepatitis C. Below are some resources for people who are interested in drug and alcohol treatment programs in the Spokane area.

Project Access is a regional network of physicians and hospitals working to provide specialty-level healthcare access

Local clinics that provide hepatitis C treatment:

Hepatitis C treatment can last up to 24 weeks and requires ongoing follow-up and monitoring of your viral load. In many cases, providers will refer you to a specialist for treatment. Specialists in gastroenterology, hepatology, or infectious diseases are well qualified to treat most patients with hepatitis C.
